

Monthly Activities/Projects of Special Interest

Director of Health

- Facilitated Regional Discussion on shared medical countermeasure distribution sites
- Oversaw hiring process for new Environmental Health Inspector/Sanitarian position
- Attended Healthcare Coalition meeting to gather information on upcoming EP contract

Administrative

- Food service licensing continues. Approximately 500 annual license renewals will be processed.
- Final spending on the Emergency Preparedness Grant and Lead Prevention grants is being tracked so that all monies are spent and reported properly at the end of the grant period (June 30).
- Insurance carrier changes, upcoming Union contract changes and personnel changes have impacted the Administrative workload.

Environmental Health Activities for June 2016

We received a number of applications for the sanitarian position vacated by Jovan. Interviews were conducted and Kristin Olsson, a Registered Sanitarian from the Farmington Valley Health District was offered, and accepted, the job. She will start on July 18th and will be located in Newington with Barbara.

We used the two food inspection contractors to cover routine Newington and Berlin food inspections this month. It is expected that we will be able to phase them out in August after Kristin starts.

The summer temporary event season has started with a number of events both large and small. Annual inspections were conducted for a number of sport field concession stands.

Barbara attended the DPH training on Evaluating Sous Vide and the Acidification of Sushi Rice. This training was offered in response to a bill that passed last year which will allow some new food preparation processes to be used in Connecticut. Although the bill passed, the provisions will not go into effect until the DPH has finalized regulations governing the use of these new techniques. The new regulations are anticipated this fall.

Berlin Activities and Projects

- A new hair salon called Headmasters was reviewed and approved. One additional proposed hair salon in a single family home is under review.
- Plans were reviewed for outside renovations to two foodservice establishments and for the addition of a cold storage area within a food manufacturing plant.

- The Farmer's Market opened for the season, including two new food vendors.
- Septic work included soil testing and installation inspections for one septic repair and one septic tank replacement, and three B100a reviews.

Newington Activities and Projects

- Housing complaints continue to require a lot of time. Several referrals were received from local
 convalescent facilities, which required home inspections. Several complicated housing complaints
 are ongoing. CCHD is working with Newington Human Services.
- The town pools at Mill Pond Park and Church Hill Park were inspected and opened.
- Temporary events included the annual Classic Car Show, a soccer tournament and a Parks & Rec event.
- Two new barbershops opened in town (Garrett's on Lowrey Place and Zurell's on Stoddard Ave). One new hair salon is under construction (Cost Cutters on Main St). A pizza restaurant opened under new management (Vivaldi Pizza on Willard Avenue).
- The DOT cafeteria renovations are complete and the cafeteria reopened. They will no longer have outside itinerant vendors providing food.

Rocky Hill Activities and Projects

- CCHD hosted a "Get the Lead Out" day for local residents to bring in household items to be tested for lead content.
- The town pools were inspected and opened for the season.
- One new itinerant vendor and several temporary foodservice vendors were inspected and licensed.
- One daycare and two foodservice establishment plans were reviewed.

Wethersfield Activities and Projects

- A new nail salon opened. Plans were reviewed for one new foodservice establishment.
- The Wethersfield Fireworks were held on June 4th with 10 food vendors.
- Weekly water sampling started at the Mill Wood swimming pond.

Community Health

PREVENTION BLOCK GRANT

- The Walking Competition was underway as of June 1- June 29. During this time, weekly tallies were provided to the town contact people. Trouble-shooting included verifying and/or seeking corrections for participant step/data entries. Press releases were written and sent, press inquiries and inquiries from the public were followed-up. There were more than 15 inquiries into the program and at least 5 articles published before and during the competition.
- Met with Craig Minor to discuss Newington updates to the POCD and potential steps forward.

ASTHMA

• Betty Murphy, Program Coordinator and I planned a strategy for her to increase outreach to pediatricians in the health district. Betty will be mailing program information to local physicians and will follow-up in late July to answer questions and/or provide more information.

SMILES FOR LIFE DENTAL GRANT

• CCHD received an additional \$1,500 from NCAAA to put on extra clinics until September 2016. Supplementary clinics will be planned with our two hygienists throughout August and September.

CHILDHOOD LEAD CASE MANAGEMENT

- Case tracking and management of lead poisoned children is on-going via DPH Maven database.
- "Get the Lead Out" Day was held on June 4, 2016 at the Cora J. Belden Library in Rocky Hill, using the

DPH XRF testing device to test over 40 items.

- Residents of pre-1978 apartments and multifamily homes in the district received lead prevention mailings. Over 1,700 letters were mailed, using address lists from Town Assessors' offices. So far, only about 160 letters have been returned.
- To keep town managers informed, each received an email including same attachments that were sent to residents.

EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS

• <u>Deliverables</u>:

- 1. Participated in Region 3 ESF 8 PH meeting re potential need/viability for a regional distribution site.
- 2. Participated in Newington LEPC meeting which included discussion of potential communication options during day to day and mass dispensing events.
- 3. Final deliverables were submitted, the budget reviewed and items were purchased, to improve POD functionality.
- 4. Participated in the Health Coalition state-wide meeting, to update local health departments on cyberterrorism, and state PHEP plans and funds.
- <u>Volunteer Status</u>: The Press releases sent last month have begun to yield results. Five (5) potential volunteers have been sent the paperwork to complete. The Volunteer Newsletter was mailed and included the dates for the fall Flu Clinics, the Everbridge notification system testing, participation in exercises and a request to update their contact information.
- Emergency Notification Lists: Notification of the primary responders was tested with 92% response rate.
- <u>Flyers:</u> Two new flyers were printed and will be distributed to key town staff for their information and use. They will also be made available to town residents. These were developed with the assistance of two University of Hartford, School of Nursing Master's degree students.

 - 2. "Get prepared It starts with you. A resource guide for emergency shelter staff" (For town and volunteer shelter staff)

One (RN) has returned a completed form and has volunteered to assist at three (3) fall Flu Clinics. The Everbridge notification system has been updated via volunteers calls or forms sent back. An Everbridge test will hopefully be done at the end of August or early September as part of staffing Flu Clinics.
- Supplies: A volunteer is assisting with a re-inventory of all EP supplies, documenting on an EXCEL spreadsheet and helping to reorganize and repack/label supplies.
- Working with Rocky Hill re revisions to their EOP, Annex G Health & Medical.
- COOP: Have begun to look for a structure to add more detail to Plan.
- Flu Clinics:
 - 1. All forms and necessary information being reviewed and revised. Awaiting updated Algorithms for vaccine administration to children and allergy to eggs.

- 2. Preparing to order supplies and complete packing vaccinator (medical) and non-medical supplies.
- 3. Meeting held to review preparation status against Flu Plan monthly preparation calendar. Basically on schedule.
- PHAB: Participated in review of changes especially to EP.
- Researched information re drug collection points: only Newington provides this service on an ongoing basis through NPD. Others have not conducted drug collections in several years.

Environmental Health Activities

Kristin Olsson started on July 18th. She has been busy inspecting food establishments and salons, as well as housing and other complaints.

We had one new child lead case in Rocky Hill. This is a two year old who recently moved to Rocky Hill from Hartford. A site visit determined that the exposure most likely occurred before the child moved into the district.

Salon inspection training was conducted for all the sanitarians. An outside contractor was brought in to offer a classroom training followed by an onsite inspection at a full service salon in Rocky Hill.

We used the two food inspection contractors to cover routine Newington food inspections this month. It is expected that we will phase them out in August.

The summer temporary event season has started with a number of events, large and small, held in the district.

Berlin Activities and Projects

Reviewed remodel plans for Taco Bell and Burger King.

Conducted a site meeting with the new owner of the Farmington Ave. Restaurant.

Met with new Brewery owner at the proposed site location to review building requirements.

Met with the owner of a new hair salon currently under construction.

Conducted inspections at three Berlin public schools for the YMCA which will be opening after school child care programs in the schools in September.

Started to prepare a PowerPoint presentation on food safety for the Berlin High School Culinary class, to be presented in September.

Newington Activities and Projects

The Farmer's Market opened for the season. It is held on Saturdays in Market Square.

Temporary events included the Newington Extravaganza which was well attended. A total of 24 food booths were inspected.

Charles and Barbara met with the Highway Department to discuss monitoring well sampling at the former Newington Landfill. They have been sampling the monitoring wells since the start of 2016 (formerly CCHD conducted the quarterly sampling). We discussed how CCHD might be able to help the town with this in the future.

Charles and Barbara attended the Newington Safe Homes Task Force meeting. Newington has developed a new intake form for referrals and complaints involving housing issues.

Rocky Hill Activities and Projects

Inspected Shad Row and met with the owner to discuss ongoing health code violations.

Conducted multiple inspections at Michel Angelo's restaurant (Greg and Jeff) due to numerous health code violations. The restaurant was closed for a time to address these violations. Two follow up inspections have been conducted since reopening to monitor compliance.

Reviewed and approved plans for a new Starbucks, a Dunkin Donuts remodel, the High School kitchen renovations, a new restaurant and take out called La Piastra, and the Kiddie Academy daycare and food service operation.

Reviewed plans, inspected and licensed a new itinerant vendor called Shish Kabob Alicious.

Spoke to doctors at the CT Children's Hospital in Hartford regarding a new lead poisoned child in Rocky Hill. Collected information on the case and discussed with staff.

Reviewed several building, and planning and zoning plans for possible involvement or regulation under the Public Health code.

Reviewed the Town of Rocky Hill proposed Blight Ordinance changes.

Wethersfield Activities and Projects

Reviewed plans for a remodel at Burger King.
Inspected multiple complaints.
Continued bathing water sampling at the Mill Woods swimming pond.
Inspected several swimming pools.

PRIMER ON BERLIN HEALTH INSURANCE

Update Related to Insurance Providers Re:

Now that Open Enrollment has passed, I wanted to share with you information about the behind the scene work that was completed to ensure that we are purchasing the most cost effective, comprehensive benefits plan. The Benefits Committee concluded a year-long project in early April related to evaluating our existing health insurance provider, Anthem. This work began in March 2015, when the Town of Berlin/Berlin Board of Education contracted with a new health insurance broker, USI Insurance Services, Inc. Since that time, our Consultant, Chris Monroe and his staff have worked diligently with us to review and evaluate our current benefits. It was determined in August 2015, that we needed a full review of our Anthem Health benefits. We decided that we would conduct a market analysis to ensure that we were getting the best value for this \$8.4 million annual expense.

The process was laid out in the following order:

1. Bring in the top health insurance carriers to discuss and review their products and services;

2. Request disruption information from each carrier to identify any differences in network access that would be incurred if we changed providers;

3. Request bids from the carriers that vetted through steps 1 and 2;

4. Select the carrier based on quality of service, price, and least disruption to employees.

The Presidents of each of the 13 collective bargaining groups and associations (Town and Board of Education) were invited to attend this process. It began in October 2015, with three separate 2-hour vendor presentations. These included Anthem, CIGNA and Aetna. The presentations were very comprehensive, with each carrier offering some unique benefits. Aetna and CIGNA both provided disruption reports that indicated each had upwards of 98% consistency with our current Anthem network of providers, resulting in minimal disruption if a change were to occur.

In mid-January 2016, we requested bid proposals from the three providers - Anthem, Aetna and CIGNA. In February, we received their financial proposals for review. The committee met again several times to review the results of the RFPs. Chris Monroe had several conversations with each carrier in the weeks following. Each one of the carriers continued to find further discounts on their original bid, and each carrier was in the lead at some point over that two week period. Due to some serious negotiations and very difficult conversations with Anthem, the final numbers vetted out with an average first year savings from each of the providers of approximately \$230,000 below the initial renewal pricing from Anthem.

Unbeknownst to the majority of our employees, we have had concerns with the service side and administrative pieces of the Anthem plan (billing, claims processing, response time, etc). This, along with more than expected increases over the last few years, had us assuming that we would find a better price, better service and an equivalent or better plan elsewhere. However, during this one year process, Anthem did finally step up to the table and got serious about their pricing and their interest in correcting the service related concerns. Taking this into consideration, along with the strong employee commitment towards the Anthem product, the committee determined that the best decision, base on cost and employee satisfaction, would be to retain Anthem.

At this time, on behalf of the Town and the Board of Education, I would like to thank each member of the committee that spent countless hours meeting and discussing healthcare benefits, asking the difficult questions and seriously considering alternatives. This process was work intensive but the end result will be rewarding as we have saved money for both the Town and the School District and we expect to correct service concerns going forward.
