A. Council Communications:

1. Holiday Schedule:

2. Upcoming Events:

- ➤ Municipal Election: The Municipal Election will be held on Tuesday, November 7, 2017. All polling places will be open from 6:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m.
- ➤ Veterans' Day Program: Berlin Public Schools will be sponsoring a Veterans Day Program on Thursday, November 9, 2017 at 7:00 p.m. in the Auditorium of Berlin High School. All are welcome to attend. Please reference the attached flyer for additional information.
- ➤ Veterans' Day Ceremony: The Veterans' Commission will be holding a Veterans' Day Ceremony on Saturday, November 11th at 11:00 a.m. at the Berlin Veterans' Memorial Park on Veterans Way. B. Town Manager News:

The Capital Improvement Projects (CIP) Committee has met and begun drafting the Capital Plan for the 2018-2019 year. The operating budget packages have been sent out to the Town offices for their input. The State budget was passed and we can now move forward. The Town received approximately the amount of funding included in our budget. This year's budget process will be a

little different with the inclusion of the Board of Finance. We look forward to their inclusion in the process.

This is the last Monthly Management Newsletter being issued prior to Rachel Rochette's, Dave Evans' and Kristin Campanelli's "retirement" from the Town Council. On behalf of the Town Offices I thank them for their service and wish them well in their future endeavors.

C. <u>Department News:</u>

➤ Berlin-Peck Memorial Library

- The elevator construction began October 23rd and has a completion date of February 1, 2018.
- Working with Economic Development Director Chris Edge, we presented a program for businesses demonstrating a database of interest to them.
- Working with the Rotary Club for the second time, to present a program for the public on long term care.
- We sadly accepted the resignation of Reference Librarian Ursula Pendleton, who has been holding the fort at the Information Desk for ten (10) years.
- Seasonal events, *The Real Ghostbusters* and *Trick-or-Treating in the Library* were successes as always.
- Please see attached flyers for various events throughout the month.
- ▶ Building Department: The addition of our part time Assistant Building Official John Mascia has now become fulltime as of July 1st 2017. This hybrid position has taken on some of the workload of the Zoning department as well. The knowledge and professionalism of John's presence has been an asset to both departments and more so to the Town. The addition has allowed for the department to function and process permits more efficiently, become more thorough with inspections helping to ensure building and life safety, plan reviews, and follow up with administrative as well as building issues.

There were a total of 102 permits issued in July, 137 in August and 113 in September. There was also a total of 174 inspections performed during the month of July, 211 in August, and 131 in September, which included building, electrical, plumbing, heating ventilation and air conditioning (HVAC).

Community and Parks and Recreation Services

Parks and Recreation

- The 13th annual Scarecrow/Fall Foliage Festival was held with 14 scarecrows entered. There were many creative scarecrows that lined Farmington Avenue until October 29th.
- The annual Monster Bash/Pumpkin Decorating Contest was held at Willard School on Friday, October 27th. We partnered with the Willard School PTO and they held their Trunk or Treat the same night.
- The Community Center hosted two flu clinics in October, run by the Central Connecticut Health District.
- Basketball registration is going well with over 50% of the participants using our online Webtrac system to register.
- Registration will begin on Monday, November 27th for residents for our winter programs. Nonresidents can register starting December 4th. Information will be available on the Town website.
- Santa's Parlor will be held at the Berlin Community Center on November 27th and 28th from 6-7:30 p.m. Berlin youth in preschool through 2nd grade are welcome to meet with Santa. Santa also asks everyone to bring a donation for the Food Pantry.
- We are again working with the Senior Center and Jerome Home to offer a balance class for seniors, at the Community Center.

• The 33rd annual Tinsel Fun Run, held in conjunction with the Berlin YMCA will be held on Saturday, December 2nd. The run will be held at Berlin High School starting at 11 a.m.

Senior Center

- October's trips were to Villa Roma Resort, NY Oktoberfest, Vermont Fall Foliage, Oktoberfest @ Krucker's Resort in NY and Germanfest at Williams Inn in MA.
- October's Lunch Bunch Trip was to the Manor Inn in Milldale.
- Specialty Shopping Trips in October were to Meriden Square or Target in Meriden and Walmart in Cromwell.
- The movies for October were "Meagen Leavay" and "The Last Word".
- This month the Center held three "special" bingos October 12th was provided by Ledgecrest Convalescent Home, October 19th was provided by Newington Rapid Recovery Rehab Center, and October 26th was provided by CT Adult Family Living Program.
- On Friday, October 6th Officer Ithier from the Berlin Police Dept. conducted a no cost training on the topics of identity theft, computer fraud, phone scams and information protection at the Center.
- A presentation on "What are Adult Day Center's really about? was offered on Wednesday, October 18th. The program was sponsored by Hartford Healthcare Senior Services.
- A "Meet and Greet the Candidates" was held at the Center on Tuesday, October 24th. Candidates had the opportunity to speak for three minutes. At the conclusion, they were able to mingle with seniors over coffee and dessert.
- Commission for Aging Fall Social was held Thursday, October 26th. The afternoon started with music provided by Airborne Jazz followed by a delicious dinner.
- Kensington Nursery School Halloween Costume Parade was held on Monday, October 30th. The seniors enjoyed their costumes and "spooky" songs.
- The Senior Center has started taking Energy Assistance application for those seniors that heat with deliverable fuel, electric and gas. The program runs through to May 1st.

Social and Youth Services

- Our new Holiday Coordinator has started registering applicants for this year's Holiday Assistance Program. Last year we helped about 250 households at each holiday and anticipate similar numbers this year. The Police Department conducted a Stuff-a-Cruiser Food Drive at Stop & Shop on October 28th providing us with several pickup truckloads of food.
- The Department has also started taking Energy Assistance applications for the upcoming heating season. Eligibility is based on income, assets, and number of people in the household. We will continue taking applications throughout the heating season.
- The open enrollment period for Medicare runs from October 7th to December 15th. While we provide Medicare CHOICES counseling services year round, this is the busiest time for providing Medicare Assistance. We have a new volunteer CHOICES counselor who is helping out a couple of times a week during the open enrollment period.
- We also have a new Intern from the University of New Haven. She is a criminal justice major, and one of her projects will be to help us expand the resources available to the

Juvenile Review Board. In addition to that, she has been helping out with Holiday Assistance and some of our after school programs for children and youth.

- Working with McGee Middle School we have started a six session Youth Empowerment Summit after school group at McGee. About 30 students have registered for the group.
- We have scheduled a Red Cross Babysitting Course to be offered at McGee on three afternoons in November.
- In October we conducted four sessions of our When I'm in Charge after school program for 4th and 5th graders. All three elementary schools participated, and we are currently scheduling another round of this program for February.

> Development Services

<u>Historic District Commission:</u> The October meeting was canceled. There were no pending applications.

<u>Planning and Zoning Commission:</u> The October 12th meeting was canceled. A regular meeting and public hearings were held on October 26th.

- Bond releases were considered and approved for Lovely Development, Circlewood Drive and for Berlin Fire House, 1657 Berlin Turnpike
- 8-24 referrals were considered at the request of the Town Council and received favorable recommendations for partial abandonment of Grove Hill Right-of-Way adjacent to 462 Alling Street, and for granting a drainage easement for 76 Fuller Way.
- The public hearing considering regulations pertaining to solar panels remains open.
- A public hearing to not amend the regulations for the Growing, Producing and Dispensing of Marijuana in Berlin is scheduled for December 14th.
- Retyping of the Zoning Regulations to incorporate approved amendments into the body of the text has been completed. A public hearing on re-adoption of the re-print has been scheduled for December 14th.
- A site plan amendment of V. Brescia, for a 10,800 square foot industrial building (phase 5) at 205 Christian Lane was approved.
- A site plan amendment for driveway improvements, including landscaping, for Stan-Chem at 401 Berlin Street was approved.
- A protein shake shop, special permit use was approved for the new retail building adjacent to the new Acura dealership at 250 Berlin Turnpike.
- Façade grant applications were considered and approved for 80 Massirio Drive; 372 Main Street, and 384 Main Street.

Zoning Board of Appeals (ZBA):

- The ZBA granted location approval for an on-premises restaurant beer-wine permit for the EastTokyo Restaurant at 1135B Farmington Avenue, in the Stop & Shop plaza.
- The ZBA granted a variance for a deck extension for the property at 68 Upson Avenue.
- The next Zoning Board of Appeals meeting is scheduled for November 28, 2017.

- Facilities: The Facilities Department approved and completed a total of 482 work orders from various Town departments and schools. In addition to the work orders and the follow-up punchlist items with the Berlin High School renovation project, the following projects have been in progress or completed within the last month:
 - Surplus items are continuing to be sold on GovDeals.com freeing up storage space within buildings for better organization of operating materials.
 - The NORESCO Energy Performance contract received final approval and the project is underway. Facilities will be involved in the project until its completion, which has been extended to later this year.
 - Completed the modification of the former Home Economics Classroom to accommodate it into a Keyboard Lab at McGee Middle School.
 - Solar panels have been activated and are operational at all Elementary Schools and McGee Middle School.
 - Replaced Exhaust Fan in the kitchen of Hubbard School.
 - Installed new Exhaust Fans in the Board of Education lobby restrooms.
 - Installed a new Water Treatment System for the Library and Community Center.
 - Continued work on Police Department Dispatch Room and Radio System upgrades.
 - Continued with assistance to the Library Elevator Project, which is scheduled for a February 2018 completion.
- Finance: PKF O'Connor Davies (the Town's external auditors) completed field work on-time during October. Draft financials were being prepared and the Comprehensive Annual Financial Report is still expected to be completed by early December.

The State House and Senate passed a bi-partisan budget in October. The budget provides lower Education Cost Sharing funding than in the Town of Berlin adopted budget, but this shortfall is made up for with a Municipal Stabilization Grant.

Interviews were held with two firms who bid on the Berlin Water Control Billing and Collections Request for Proposal. Both respondents have a strong background in water and sewer billing and collections. This move represents an opportunity for the Town to move forward technologically without a significant investment of time or money.

Revenue Collector's Office: A meeting was held on October 5th with our Marshall and Constables to discuss delinquent personal property collection. Policies and procedures were established for the enforcement of delinquent personal property. A list was assembled and split equally between the Marshall and Constables. The warrants were dated November 1, 2017 and continue for a period of 60 days.

The beginning stages have begun to set up a financial interface with the Revenue Collector's office and the Accounting software. This interface will enable both departments to balance each month with greater accuracy and efficiency.

October bills for water and sewer were processed and mailed on September 29th. Approximately 2,700 bills were mailed for quarterly usage and irrigation meters. Monthly bills for 31 customers were processed and mailed on October 5th.

<u>Assessor's Office:</u> Building permits continued to be entered for the upcoming year and permit inspections continued for the 2017 Grand List. Transfers of real estate ownership continued to be processed as part of day-to-day operations.

Inspections and data entry were processed and continued to be on schedule for the 2017 revaluation. We continued mailings for interior inspections that started in January. These inspections are the ones we were unable to get into when we were there previously. Mailings to the sections remaining for full inspections (exterior and interior) began in March.

The office continued to process Certificate of Corrections for motor vehicles that were sold, stolen, totaled or transferred and for real estate as well. These included omitted items and items prorated for new construction.

<u>Purchasing:</u> The following is a summary of Request for Proposals (RFP's) and other major projects that were worked on during October:

- Invitation to Bid for Ford F-150 for Fire Marshal.
- RFQ (re-bid) for Water Control Billing Outsource Services Opened October 4th.
- RFP for Payroll, Time and Attendance Opened October 12th.
- Invitation to Bid for Snow Plows Streets Bids opened October 27th.
- Invitation to Bid for Snow Plows Cul-de-Sacs Bids opened October 27th.

Posting of Town/Board of Education surplus assets on GovDeals continues actively, with approximately \$973.50 earned on 31 completed auction listings since the start of Fiscal Year 2018.

➤ Public Works/Engineering: The following are activities that continue to be in process, or completed:

There were sixteen (16) Excavation Permits during September. We began charging \$10 for Burning Permits July 1, 2017, and there were four (4) issued in September.

<u>Public Grounds:</u> The following services were provided by the Public Grounds Department during the month of September 2017:

- Completion of walkway at Percival Soccer Field.
- Started to cut out lips and add infield mix to Sage 1, Dennehy and Centurelli Fields.
- Assisted Facilities in taking down and re-installing the scoreboard and sign at Zipadelli ballfield.
- Provided playground maintenance and playground safety surfacing to Community Playground, Worthington Ridge.
- Replaced the sign entering Town Hall Complex.
- Planted 200 mums throughout town.

Water Control: The Water Control Commission (WCC) has an on-going project to design and replace the existing booster pump station connection with the Metropolitan District

Commission (MDC) of Hartford. The project is in progress. When complete, the WCC will be able to utilize the half-million gallons per day supply from the MDC (up to one million gallons per day maximum). This pumping station cannot currently be used under normal conditions. Lenard Engineering has been given the contract to develop bid documents and oversight of the construction. LaRosa Construction (as low bidder) has been selected to manage this project. The new booster pump vault should be installed by late October, early November.

We have selected DPC, LLC to evaluate the sewer flows entering the Deming Road Sewer Pump Station. The intent is to evaluate the MDC sewage contribution to this pump station. DPC, LLC flow data is clear that the MDC contributes at least 80% of the flow into the Deming Road Pump Station. An invoice is being prepared for the MDC to be submitted for their share of the pumping service Berlin WCC provides. DPC, LLC is creating a design for an upgraded pump station.

DPC, LLC is conducting a Rate Study. This review and report should be completed in several months.

Well 1-B is now operational. We still need some work at the well field. The Connecticut Department of Public Health (DPH) has yet to give final approval. All physical connections of piping have been installed. The pump has been installed and re-tested and is fully operational. We are required to do additional copper/lead monitoring as a result of the new well, which is being re-evaluated by DPH.

The option of offering a secondary meter for individual customers utilizing significant outdoor water usage continues to be popular. The Berlin WCC purchased additional meters in the spring of 2016 to maintain an inventory in anticipation of a greater demand for secondary meters during the summer. Approximately 110 customers have now utilized this option and many have expressed how happy they are with it. This year, many homeowners have indicated that they have used their sprinkler systems minimally because rainfall has been sufficient.

We are in the process of working with Lenard Engineering to evaluate the Need and Design of a generator at the Elton Road well field. The report is complete, and staff is in the process of evaluating it and deciding on an option so it can be included in our Capital Improvement Plan (CIP). We anticipate this project will take place during the next fiscal year (possibly in the fall of 2018).

The Beckley Road Pressure-Reducing Valve has been re-built and is now completed.

The project to eliminate the Savage Hill Pump Station (with the engineering completed by MBA Consultants) is on-going. The directional drilling for this project is being re-bid because of the high prices on the first proposals. The second bid notice still has very high bids, so we are still considering traditional trenching to evaluate that cost versus directional drilling.

D. <u>Board/Commission News:</u>

E. <u>CCM Correspondence</u>:

F. Project Updates:

- 1. **High School Civil Rights and Accreditation Project:** No Change Ongoing project updates, advisory committee meetings and bi-weekly owner meetings continue to occur along with published monthly updates prepared by Gilbane and placed onto the Town's website. Council receives abbreviated updates monthly as necessary. The project is now 98 percent complete. Contractors are working on punchlist items.
- 2. Infiltration/Inflow Sewer Project: We have received confirmation from the State Department of Energy and Environmental Protection (DEEP) on the viability of financing to undertake additional work within the Belcher Brook Watershed Trunk Line. Cardinal Engineering Associates has developed an Amendment #3 and Amendment #4 approved by Town Council on June 7, 2016. Camera evaluation of the Interceptor has been done. Both the Army Corps and the State DEEP have given the go ahead to proceed with the project. The project went before the Wetlands Commission in May for their approval. The project is being reviewed by DEEP. Berlin WCC Staff reviewed the final proposal before the application went to DEEP for funding consideration. We are adjusting the schedule so that it starts in the spring of 2018. We are preparing paperwork to submit to DEEP for a loan request and approval. Town Council will vote for temporary bonding for this project.
- 3. Street Paving Projects: No Change Paving is complete on Winchell Drive, Woodruff Lane, Cole Lane, Briar Patch, Rabbit Trail and Partridge Lane. Old Brickyard Lane is currently under re-construction.
- 4. Spruce Brook Bridge Over Spruce Brook: No Change Final design is nearing completion, including the incorporation of the historic elements of the site into the new structure. The local Inland Wetlands and Flood Hazard permits were approved in July. We are awaiting approval of both State and Federal permits. We expect to bid the project this spring, with construction anticipated to begin later this year. Currently, the bridge site is undergoing historic review; Historic Perspectives, Inc. is working with the Berlin Historic Society to minimize impacts to the site. Connecticut Department of Transportation (CT DOT) is working with the state Historic Preservation Office.
- 5. Farmington Avenue Bridge (Over Sebethe River): The bid opening occurred February 11, 2016. The low-bidder was Mastrobattisto, Inc. of Bristol, CT having submitted a bid of \$2,348,391.75. Several change orders have increased costs to approximately 3 million dollars to complete the project. Several delays with utility relocations have been encountered. The discovery of contaminated soils adjacent to the westerly abutment, have also delayed the project's progress. The project is approximately 98% complete. The Contractor was allowed to continue work during the winter shutdown period (December through March), weather permitting, in an attempt to bring the project back on schedule. Farmington Avenue was opened for vehicular traffic on Saturday, October 14th. The contractual completion date was established as July 30, 2017. Failure to be substantially complete at that time necessitated the Town to institute the contractually provided assessment of liquidated damages. These damages

are assessed at \$1,000.00 per day through October 14, 2017.

- 6. Elton Wells Water Control Commission: No Change Our new Well 1B is operational. We are still looking at some operational upgrades at the well field. We will also be required to conduct more testing as a result of the Connecticut Department of Public Health.
- 7. Burnham Street Bridge and High Road Bridges: No Change The permitting and easement process is in progress, and final designs have been received. The bids for the High Road project were received and opened on March 23rd. As you are aware, Town Council awarded the project to be constructed by Martin Laviero of Bristol, CT. Due to a recent change in the State DOT construction oversite approvals, the start of construction will be delayed until the spring of 2018 to avoid a winter-long road closure. The Burnham Street Bridge construction is scheduled for 2018.
- 8. Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices (MUTCD) Sign Project: No Change The Town has begun a project replacing the traffic signs in compliance with the Federal Highway Standards MUTCD. This work will continue to be an ongoing project for the next several years.
- 9. Streetscape Improvements: Cardinal Engineering is in the process of doing a survey of the triangle made up of Main Street, New Britain Road and Farmington Avenue. This will give them a distinct "map" to modify the existing streetscape (as needed) as well as look to find ways to increase the # of parking spaces. A concept plan will be created and then presented to the property owners, Economic Development, Planning and Zoning, the Town Council, Fire Departments and Police Commission.
- 10. Train Station Improvements & 889 Farmington Avenue Remediation: We met with DOT and have found out that the immediate plan is to not reconstruct a building on the footprint of the former Berlin Train Station. Future options are being looked at, but no definitive plans for a new building are in place, due to a lack of resources and concrete plan. The RFQ has been released for the three (3) parcels for private mixed-use development on 889, 903, and 913 Farmington Avenue. To date, five (5) different developers have reached out to Chris Edge with all five doing a tour of the area and the Town of Berlin. The response date is December 5, 2017.
- 11.1567 Berlin Turnpike Environmental Remediation: Testing will be done through 2018 with Alta Environmental Corporation, the firm who has been doing work to date.
- 12. **Façade Grant Program:** Three new projects were approved by the Economic Development and Planning and Zoning Commissions in October.
- 13. **Gateway Signs:** No Change The signs have been installed throughout the town and feedback has been very positive.
- 14. **Kensington Village Sidewalk Project:** Complete Services LLC of Oakville, CT was awarded the contract in the amount of \$379,000.00 in May. Sidewalks have been constructed along Kensington Road, Camels Back, Four Rod Road, Burnham Street and Grove Hill. The project

is essentially complete at this time. We are awaiting the utility company's pole relocations to be completed which in turn will allow the contractor to complete the project.

- 15. **Earl Wicklund (Stick Village):** Building 4 has been completed and is just in need of interior fit-out. Although no tenants have signed leases yet, activity and effort continues.
- 16. **ACURA/Retail Development:** A Grand Opening and ribbon cutting was held on October 19th with a large number of guests and dignitaries attending. We should be proud of this amazing building and that it is in Berlin.
- 17. Forrest Machine/Christian Lane Development: The 55,000 square foot building has been completed and the inside is now being fit-out. The expectation is occupancy by the end of 2017 or early 2018 bringing about 50 manufacturing positions to Berlin with new hires coming soon after.
- 18. **Berlin High School and Berlin Businesses:** Berlin High School saw its first partner event with Junior Achievement on November 1st with private sector individuals coming into the school to explain and work on interview skills with Juniors and Seniors. This was the first of four different events planned during this school year including some visitations to businesses.





Transportation

The Senior Center Buses and Van may be used by any Berlin resident who is age 60 and older, or any person with a disability, 18 years or older. These vehicles are equipped with a wheelchair lift and operate Monday-Friday from 8:30am to 3;30pm. Service is curb to curb; therefore, riders that may require assistance getting to or from the curb should be accompanied by a companion who can provide such assistance. The driver may use his discretion to determine whether or not transportation will be provided in the event that safety is a factor. This includes personal modes of passenger's mode of transportation must be able to be tied securely, both in the front and back of the unit. In the case of Scooters, the passenger must be able to transfer to a seat on the Senior Center vehicle.

Bus Shopping & Schedule Information

Reservations and cancellations call: (860) 828-7006.

Please remember to have the address of the doctor and the time of appointment in front of you when calling to reserve a ride. You are responsible for having the correct information. For your ride home from a scheduled appointment call: (860) 250-0510.

We do medical appointments in Berlin and New Britain only. All medical appointments should be scheduled between 9:00am and 1:15pm. Reservations must be made at least 48 hours in advance. We do regular appointments in Berlin only. (Banks, pharmacies, post office, hair and nail salons and any town buildings). Reservations must be made at least 24 hours in advance.

All bus reservations must be made during our regular business hours, 8:30AM to 3:30PM. All calls for rides home MUST BE MADE BY 3:00 PM. Cancellations can be taken at anytime. Voicemail is available after normal business hours. You are allowed two stops per day except when going to the grocery store.

Our weekly grocery shopping schedule is Monday -Stop & Shop, Tuesday -Shop Rite and Wednesday -Stop & Shop We can take up to a maximum of six (6) shoppers except when the Director approves for more than six. All riders should be ready one hour in advance of their scheduled appointment time. We are unable to provide transportation to and from medical procedures, Dialysis or discharges from the hospitals or other facilities. You are not allowed any unscheduled stops unless the Senior Center Director has approved it. *This vehicle has been paid in part by a grant from the Federal Transit Administration-Section 5310 and therefore extends transportation services to disabled Berlin residents regardless of age. Please contact the Senior Center at (860) 828-7006 to request transportation.

If you have previously signed up for the Connecticut Do Not Call List, your registration has already been added . If you want to register for the first time, call 1-888-382-1222. You must call from each phone number you want to register. No written, faxed or emailed registration will be processed. Your cell phone number can now be released to telemarketing companies and you may receive sale calls. You will be charged for these calls. To prevent this, call the above number from your cell phone

Dial 211 Info line is a partnership of the Connecticut United Ways and the State of Connecticut. It provides a single source for information about community services, referrals to human services and crisis intervention. It's toll free from anywhere in Connecticut and operates 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. Give it a try!

Charter Oak Pass provides access to the State of Connecticut's Parks and Recreation System and is available only to Connecticut residents, age 65 and older. There is NO CHARGE for this pass and is a life issue pass. Application forms are available here at the senior center or you may call the State Parks Department in Hartford at 424-3200.

We will be taking appointments for Energy Assistance applications for those seniors who heat with DELIVERABLE FUEL (OIL, KEROSENE & PROPANE). Every Thursday from 8:30am to 3:30pm we will be taking applications by appointments. The following documentation is needed: Copy your latest bank statement (All Pages) showing direct deposit of you 2017 check. Must be current or not more than one month old, Copy of your latest 2017 pension check or bank statement (All Pages) showing direct deposit. Must be current or not more than one month old., Assets-Proof of each account. Must show current value (not interest earned) of all "liquid" accounts, such as bank books, check books, CD's, money markets, IRA's, stocks, bonds, etc. Your "liquid" assets-can not exceed \$12,000 (renters) or \$15,000 for (homeowners). If you are over the asset limit, the difference will be added to your income. All pages of all assets will be required., Gas or Electric Bills are required for households whose primary heat is gas or electric. The name and address on the bill must match one member of the household who is applying for Energy Assistance, Social Security Numbers and dates of birth for each member of the household, Name, address and telephone number of landlord. A Rent receipt is only required for people whose heat is included in their rent., Name and address of your oil vendor or other vendor of deliverable fuel (coal, propane, etc.). Check with vendor to be sure that they are participating in the State of CT Energy Assistance Program for the 2017/2018 heating season., Income must be shown for every member of the household. If employed-household member(s) must provide last four consecutive paystubs. Annual Income guidelines (for households whose heat is not included in their rent) are as follows:

One Person Household - Income cannot exceed \$ 34,366 Two Person Household – Income cannot exceed \$ 44,940

Monthly Activities/Projects of Special Interest

Director of Health

- Conducted hearings for food establishments that have had several failed inspections to determine corrective action plans.
- Participated in Health Information Technology workgroup to provide feedback on local public health capacity to contribute and utilize information from a health information exchange.
- Attended meeting of healthcare professionals hosted by State Senator Gerratana to provide information on local efforts to address opioid epidemic.

Administrative

- First meeting with Charles Costello, CPA for the 2016-2017 audit was held. He plans to present his findings at the October Board meeting.
- Excess paper clean up has begun in the Central office. Files were consolidated and moved to make better use of space.
- Jane continues to gather insurance billing information in preparation for flu immunization billing.
- 3300 pre-filled flu registration forms were sent out.
- Food establishment licensing is complete (all but one.)
- Printed and mailed a letter to approximately 500 Food Service Establishments.

Community Health Highlights

Asthma - Putting On Airs (POA)

In August, the final month of the 3rd year of this 5-year grant, Betty Murphy spent time training her asthma educators, based on some updates from a national conference. The new bi-lingual Asthma Educator is making progress under Betty and Jan's guidance. In addition, she continues collaborate with the state on working out the kinks in their newer database program.

Betty continues to develop partnerships with healthcare providers such as ProHealth, UConn Health Center in Farmington, and Farmington Pediatrics. However, the primary source of referrals continues to be CCMC. Additionally, in collaboration with a research project at Yale School of Public Health all English speaking families visited who have a child between the ages of 5-11 receive information on the Children's Air Pollution Study (CAPS). Participation is optional.

The two new tablets purchased this month will improve the learning options for asthma patients and their families.

Block Grant

DPH Block Grant Project Officer, Eugene Nichols paid a site visit to CCHD on August 10. He encouraged us to forge ahead as he is pleased with the actions taken to date, and the plans for the coming months.

Those plans include public bike repair stations. In working with the town planners, it was determined that each town would a public bike repair stations. The stations are on order for three of the four towns, with the forth town slated to receive one in the next fiscal year.

Community Outreach/Involvement

Tick-Borne Disease Presentation: Berlin Senior Center and the Berlin-Peck Memorial Library requested CCHD to provide an information session on tick-borne diseases. In response Health Educator, Lori DiPietro, MPH created a presentation called "Ticks: What You Need to Know". Fourteen people attended this August 14th event and of those, three or four had Lyme disease. These individuals shared invaluable information and experience that benefitted the group.

Opioid Stakeholder Forum Follow-up: Recovery Group

Health Educator, Lori DiPietro created a Facebook page called "Central Connecticut Supports Recovery". This was one of the steps the "Recovery Group" has taken in their quest to learn what it means to become "Recovery-Supportive" communities. The page was created in support of and to facilitate participation in the statewide Recovery Walk, on September 23rd from 10:00 am – 2:00 pm in Bushnell Park in Hartford.

The Prevention and Response groups continue to meet regularly. With assistance from Erica Texeira of Wethersfield Social Services, CCHD has planned a meeting featuring Manchester Police Chief Marc Montminy for the Response Group. Since 2016, Project HOPE (Heroin/Opioid Prevention Initiative) gives addicts a chance to get into treatment instead of into further trouble with the law. Police, first responders from our towns and social service providers are invited for the September 15th meeting.

Emergency Preparedness

State: As of July 31, details are pending on PHEP 2017-2018 grant activities. This year, the Capital Region Council of Governments (CROG) will manage the administrative aspects of the grant.

Regional: Judye is serving on a public health resource typing working group for the regional planning group. **Local:** The volunteer database review is completed. Updates and revisions of Point of Dispensing site plans are continuing.

Flu Clinics: Judye requested the participation of the Newington CERT team as volunteers for the October flu clinics. This year, we are testing a new dispensing site: St. James Church in Rocky Hill, (St. Josephine Bakhita parish). The parking lot is large with ample handicap parking. Easy access from all four-health district main arteries is another beneficial feature of this site.

Judye also organized an interview of Charlie Brown for WJMJ radio and ORTV. Stephanie Valickis interviewed Charlie, with the camera rolling, on August 28. The interview will air in late September.

Dental Grant

CCHD received notification that the North Central Area Agency on Aging (NCAAA) accepted and will fund the grant proposal for senior dental clinics. The grant cycle will begin on October 1, 2017 and continue through September 30, 2018. Additionally, the town-funded clinics for the 2016-2017 will wrap-up by the end of September.

Environmental Health Activities for August 2017

- We issued a letter to all food establishments in the district regarding upcoming changes based on Connecticut's adoption of the FDA Model Food Code. The letter included information on the temperature changes which become effective October 1, 2017 and changes to training requirements for Certified Food Managers (presently Qualified Food Operators) which become effective July 1, 2018.
- Staff is working on reclassifying all food establishments in accordance with the new FDA classifications. These changes will take effect on October 1, 2017 and will change the inspection frequencies for many establishments. Analysis of the changes and the impact on workload and budget/fees will be conducted in September.
- The revised Temporary Food License Application and accompanying guidance documents were posted to the CCHD website.

Berlin Activities and Projects

- Attended a Planning & Zoning meeting to provide documents and testimony for an ongoing subdivision/new construction situation.
- Delivered a presentation on food safety for Berlin public school cafeteria workers.
- Conducted a plan review for a new Dollar Tree.
- Conducted a plan review for a new nail salon.
- Conducted a new owner inspection for a new restaurant.
- Processed Berlin Fair applications and conducted consultations.

Newington Activities and Projects

- Attended Safe Homes Taskforce meeting.
- Conducted five daycare inspections.
- Conducted routine pool inspections.
- Attended two Food Establishment Hearings with DOH.
- Met with the owner of a proposed smoothie bar on Fenn Road.
- Discussed plans and building renovations for a new middle eastern catering facility on Willard Avenue.
- Continued follow up investigations and monitoring on a number of complaints.

Rocky Hill Activities and Projects

- Reviewed draft Rocky Hill Housing Code for conformance with CCHD code.
- Inspected all seasonal public pools.
- Issued a food service license to The Salad bar located on Cromwell Ave.
- Inspected the installation of a new septic tank on a property where the previous tank collapsed.
- Received the report of a lead poisoned child, working with our Public Health Educator to provide information to the parents and determine the source of lead poisoning.
- Received plans for a new restaurant called Tavern on 3 to be located on Cromwell Ave.
- Inspected a carnival and another temporary event.
- Approved plans for a building addition currently served by a septic system.
- Issued a food service license to BHOG a new Indian restaurant.

- Investigated numerous environmental complaints.
- Provided oversight of an apartment cleanup which involved hoarding and a deceased person that was not discovered until after 3 weeks after passing.
- Inspected, and issued a legal order for the cleanup of a condo in which the occupant was ill and unsanitary conditions existed. The unit was deemed unfit for human occupancy.
- A restaurant was closed several times due to numerous serious violations of the CT Public Health code.
- Approved preliminary plans for a new restaurant in a former train station near the CT River.
- Applied mosquito larvicide to standing water at Brimfield Village in Rocky Hill.

Wethersfield Activities and Projects

- Continued to monitor a hoarding and cockroach situation at an apartment complex.
- Inspected several complaints, Wethersfield.
- Inspected several new food vendors at the Wethersfield Farmers Market.
- Site visited and consulted with three new restaurants to be opened this fall.
