## **Berlin Board of Police Commissioners Regular Meeting**

A meeting of the Board of Police Commissioners was called to order by Chairman Paul Eshoo at 6:30pm on Wednesday February 19, 2020. The meeting was held at the Berlin Police Department, 240 Kensington Road, Berlin CT.

**Present:** Chairman Paul Eshoo, Vice-Chairman Steve Wilson, Commissioner Dave Rogan, Commissioner Ryan Zelek, Commissioner Melissa Urrunaga, Chief John Klett and Recording Secretary, Marlene Way.

The meeting was called to order at 6:30pm and Commissioner Rogan led us with the Pledge of Allegiance.

**Audience of Citizens:** Susan Kwasniewski and John O'Brien

Susan Kwasniewski was in attendance to voice her concern regarding Bicentennial Park and the individual "policing" the park looking for people who have dogs who are not leashed. Mrs. Kwasniewski also mentioned the nephew of this individual who said he would kill any dog who was not leashed if it attacked him.

The Chief mentioned that he is aware of both individuals and that we are monitoring the situation. He also said that we need Berlin citizens to call the police department if either crosses the line.

Mr. O'Brien made a brief statement that officers have to deal with many different situations in Berlin.

### **Approval of Minutes**

Chairman Eshoo asked for an update on the officers who were not performing to standard last month. Chief Klett indicated that all officers were now performing to standard this month.

Chairman Eshoo asked about the cells. He wanted to know approximately how many prisoners we get in a week. Chief Klett indicated on average, we get a couple a week. He also mentioned that the ventilation is doing better.

Commissioner Dave Rogan made a motion to approve the January 15, 2020 meeting minutes. This motion was seconded by Vice-Chairman Steve Wilson. All were in favor.

### **Correspondence**

### **Review of Reports**

### **Youth Report**

The Chief wanted to note Case Number 1655. Received a compliment that the criminal mischief at Percival Pond has stopped.

### **Training**

The Chief mentioned that he included the fourth quarter training for your review. He also mentioned that the Reserve Officer goes to training on his own time and that we do not pay for his training. He covers it.

### **Budget**

The Chief indicated that we are doing well. We are a little over on personnel due to one officer on workers compensation. We are still down two officers, but we currently have two people in backgrounds. We have two open seats in the academy in June.

### **Traffic Reports**

All of the officers are working above benchmark.

Commissioner Melissa Urrunaga asked what is considered "Benchmark". Benchmark is ten "10" self-initiated stops.

Please note that Officer Lajoie is on FTO and has just completed the academy.

Crashes are down from last year. This is most likely due to the weather being better this year.

## **Monthly Report**

Under employee recognition, the Chief wanted to note that Officer Ithier helped Newington with a Spanish-speaking suspect. The Chief received an email thanking us for the assistance.

Commissioner Melissa Urrunaga asked how many Spanish-speaking officers do we have? We have one. The Chief mentioned that we also have one polish-speaking officer.

## **Traffic Safety Plan**

The Traffic Safety Plan is a goal of the Chief. The Chief worked with Lt. Drew Gallupe and Traffic Officer Tom Bobok.

The Chief detailed his plan.

Most common Intersection:	Middletown Road with 34 crashes
Most common time of day:	2:00pm
Most common turnpike intersection:	Deming Road
Most common cause of crash:	Following too closely

## **DUI Enforcement Plan**

The Chief had Lt. Shawn Solek prepare an enforcement improvement plan. Lt. Solek's data has shown that roving patrols have historically been done, with most DUI crashes occurring between the hours of 7pm and 3am. The location data also showed that most crashes have occurred on the Berlin Turnpike.

Commissioner Rogan asked what roving patrols were. The Chief indicated that they were self-initiated patrols where the officers were looking for DUI's specifically.

Commissioner Rogan asked if cameras could be used for traffic accidents. The Chief indicated that there are laws concerning cameras. Cameras are license plate readers. The camera will tell you if the car is registered, stolen, etc. These do not specifically pick up who is driving the car.

## **Building Project – Statement of Need**

The Town Manager has stated that he feels the necessary improvements the police department needs should be made until such time that the Town can afford to build a

new police department, possibly within the next 8-10 years. This is while the Town tries to find a new location.

We do not have hard/soft interview rooms, juvenile facilities, etc.

Town Manager is looking for input from the Police Commission.

Vice-Chairman Steve Wilson asked if the Town Manager's proposal stays within the footprint of what we have now? The Chief indicated that it does.

Vice-Chairman Wilson stated that we need to prioritize our list so we get the top things we want. We need another meeting to make our case with Finance, Building Committee, etc.

The Chief indicated that they are in support of doing the work.

Vice-Chairman Steve Wilson made a motion to have a meeting, which will be on the record. This meeting will include the Town Manager, the Mayor, Finance, The Building Committee, The Chief of Police and the Police Commission. The meeting will go through each item, the cost and what needs to be done in what order in the police department. Commissioner Dave Rogan seconded this motion. All were in favor. Motion was passed.

### **Main Street Project**

The Chief discussed the revisions to the Main Street project. This is at an advisory stage with Public works looking for input

This will be an improvement. A couple of parking spaces will be added. The plans for this project never came to the Commission prior to construction before. The Police Commission wants to get this right as they will not get another change to do this again.

Recommended improvements to crosswalks and that mid-street bump outs be removed. Vice Chairman Steve Wilson would like the Traffic Officer to look this over very carefully.

### **Beach Hill Development**

This project is located on Rt. 5 near the Blue Lobster, South of Deming Road.

After all options were presented by Chief Klett, the Commission unanimously agreed that Option A was the best way to proceed. A recommendation will be made to DOT who has final authority as this is a State road.

A light should be put at the entrance with a cut through put in the road. This will help lighten the traffic at Deming road.

### **Executive Session**

A motion was made by Vice-Chairman Steve Wilson at 7:19pm to go into Executive Session to discuss personnel matters and contract issues. This motion was seconded by Commissioner Dave Rogan. All were in favor.

A motion was made by Commissioner Ryan Zelek at 7:48pm to leave Executive Session. This motion was seconded by Commissioner Dave Rogan. All were in favor.

### **Adjournment**

Commissioner Dave Rogan made a motion to adjourn at 7:49pm. This was seconded by Vice-Chairman Steve Wilson. All were in favor.

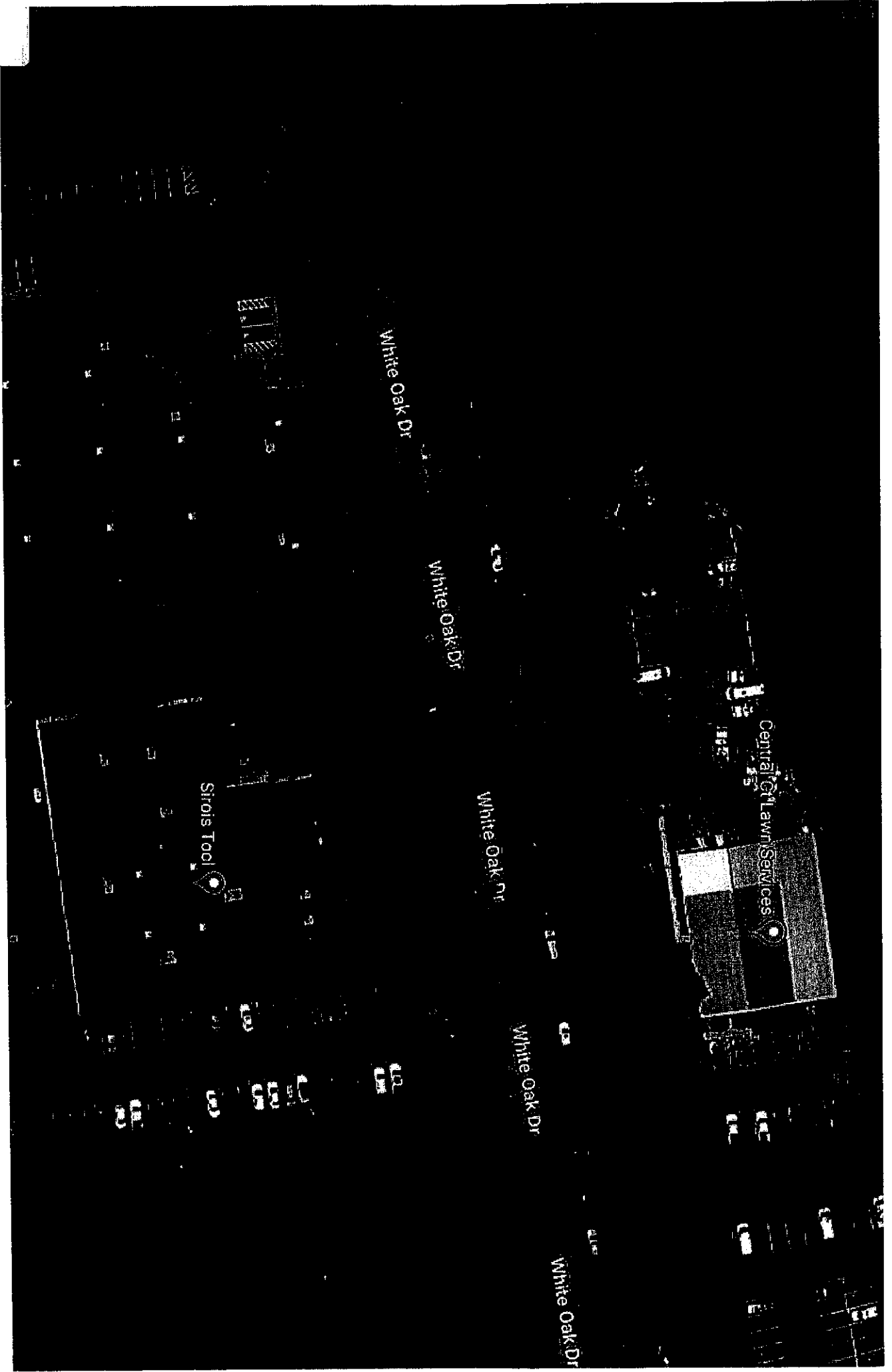
Re: White Oak Dr. "No Parking"

On 2/28/2020, I met with Chris Edge, Economic Development Director, about parking on White Oak Drive. Mr. Edge stated that Central CT Lawn Service has grown and has hired enough people so that they have outgrown their available parking. Their employees have been parking along White Oak Drive and, until now, there has not been any issues.

Soon, a new business is expected to open in the building at the very end of White Oak Drive and the business is concerned that parked cars may interfere with deliveries made by large tractor-trailer trucks. Edge has requested some "No Parking" signs in the area to prevent any such conflict.

I met with Edge and examined the area of concern. As a result, I am requesting the approval of the appropriate "No Parking" signs be installed prohibiting parking in the cul-de-sac to allow for the backing and other movement of trucks accessing the loading dock. Additional "No Parking" signs restricting parking to only one side of the street in the area of the businesses near the end of the cul-de-sac.

The street is wide enough to accommodate parking on one side without restricting the movement of even the largest of tractor-trailers. I have attached a photo marked with red dots in the areas where signs are requested. If approved, I will work with the Highway Department on specific placement of the appropriate signs.


