

Conservation Goal from the 2013 POCD

- Goal/Policy: Preserve and protect key features of Berlin's cultural landscape. Examples of features with cultural importance include: the historic district of Worthington Ridge; Clark's Grove in East Berlin; historic industrial structures such as the Main Street complex by Paper Goods Pond being made into condominiums; the train depot; the Berlin Fairgrounds; remaining agricultural lands even if not actively farmed; and, the unique features of historic church and parish life in old Berlin, including cemeteries and greens.
 - Strategy: Retain and improve the cultural landscape of the community including the historic fabric, scenic views, stonewalls and scenic vistas along roadways

Historic Preservation Primer

- Local Historic Districts: A Local Historic District offers the most protection for significant historic and architectural buildings in Connecticut and allows municipalities to establish districts for which exterior architectural changes are reviewed by a local preservation commission. This allows towns to ensure that alterations, additions or demolitions are in keeping with special character of the designated district.
- State Register Properties: The State Register of Historic Places is Connecticut's
 official listing of structures and sites that characterize the historical development
 of the state.
- National Register Properties and Districts: The National Register of Historic Places is the nation's official list of buildings, sites or areas worthy of preservation. Listing does not restrict what the property owner may do with the property unless the owner is using federal assistance.

Historic Preservation in Berlin


- Historic District Commission (HDC) established in 1978
- HDC regulate changes within Worthington Ridge Historic District
- HDC serves as resource regarding preservation, restoration, construction and education for all historic properties within Town
- Berlin became Certified Local Government in 2012 (approved by SHPO and NPS, provides Town with technical guidance regarding preservation and funding)
- 2013 POCD recognized value of Town's agricultural heritage
- No demolition delay ordinance in Berlin (HDC formed a committee last year to research the feasibility of such an ordinance, no recommendations as of yet)

Berlin's Historic District Commission

- Authority is established through Chapter X, Article 3 of Berlin's Ordinance Code Book
- Section 10-22. Certificate of Appropriateness
 - No exterior portion of any building or structure shall be erected, altered, restored, moved or demolished within the historic district and no building permit shall be issued by the town for exterior modifications open to view from a public street, way, or place within the district until after an application for a certificate of appropriateness as to exterior architectural features has been submitted to the commission and approved by said commission. "Exterior architectural features" shall include such portion of the exterior of a structure as is open to view from the street line. In its deliberations the commission shall not take into consideration the color or paint used on the exterior of any building or structure nor shall it consider interior arrangements or use.




Worthington Ridge Historic District

- National Register listing identifies 118 resources with 94 historically and/or architecturally significant properties
- Includes institutional and commercial center of Town through 1850
- Residential properties spanning more than two centuries
- Local Historic District with similar boundary



Worthington Ridge Historic District

- Properties include residences, barns, a meeting house, hotels, taverns, and stores
- C.1720-c.1930
- Georgian, Federal, Greek Revival, Italianate, Queen Anne, Gothic Revival, Victorian, Tudor Revival, Colonial Revival and Bungalow architectural styles

Ezekiel Kelsey House

- Built c. 1760
- Excellent example of saltbox form
- Common design in Berlin during 18th century
- Listed in the National Register

Henry Hooker House


- 18th century residence, substantially altered in the Victorian era
- 19th century owner was leader in carriage manufacturing industry in New Haven
- Listed in the National Register


Kensington Soldier's Monument

- On the grounds of Kensington Congregational Church
- Designed by sculptor Nelson Augustus Moore
- Listed in the National Register




Berlin's Farms



Berlin will continue to grow, but in a sustainable manner and without compromising the town's natural resources or outgrowing its ability to provide high-quality services to its residents. Strong connections to the region and within town are highly valued by the community for all modes of travel. Berlin will balance growth against preservation of its historic landscape and village centers. The town's village centers, and farmland are important to the history and identity of Berlin; protecting and improving areas such as Kensington Center will remain a priority for the town.
